Rosh Hashana and Shabbos

Chazal instituted a takana that when Rosh Hashana falls on Shabbos, we do not blow the shofar, out of concern that one might carry the shofar in a reshus harabbim and thereby be mechallel Shabbos. This is fascinating, given that the chance that someone would violate the issur d'oraysa is quite slim, and even if it were to happen, it would be an aveira b'shogeg. The fact that Chazal were mevatel the mitzva d'oraysa of tekias shofar for all of Am Yisroel for all time because of a far-fetched concern regarding an aveira b'shogeg demonstrates the tremendous chashivus of Shabbos. We should learn from this to take kedushas Shabbos particularly seriously.

Rav Asher Weiss shlit"a writes that this takana fits into the theme of Rosh Hashana itself – malchus Hashem. Accepting a king's malchus means not only listening to the king, but listening to his avadim. One shows honor to the king by respecting his ministers and representatives. When we subjugate ourselves to the Chazal and fulfill the issurim and takanos of Chazal, who were Hashem's close servants, that deepens our kabbalas ol malchus of HaKadosh Baruch Hu Himself.

Interestingly, the Meshech Chochma refers to our refraining from blowing the shofar on Shabbos as an "akeida ruchanit," a spiritual sacrifice comparable to akeidas Yitzchak. Rav Weiss explains this comparison based on the Chasam Sofer's statement that on one level, Yitzchak's nisayon was greater than that of Avraham. Avraham heard the tzivuy from Hashem Himself, whereas Yitzchak heard it from Avraham. Yitzchak had to trust his rebbi. Avraham's command was based, in a sense, on Torah SheBichtav, while Yitzchak's command was Torah SheBe'al Peh. Therefore, when we listen to Chazal and we don't blow shofar on Rosh Hashana, we emulate Yitzchak, who accepted "Torah SheBe'al Peh" fully, without question.

Our commitment to the mesora entails hesitation to embrace innovations in our tradition. It is true that sometimes there are innovations, but in general, we are not quick to change things. Historically, the innovations that have succeeded and have been productive are those that were sanctioned by gedolei Yisroel and the leading rabbonim of the generations. Those innovations that were rejected by the gedolim did not succeed. Perhaps the greatest example of an innovation in the last century is the Beis Yaakov movement. Most Orthodox women are now educated very differently than their great-great-grandmothers were. This is a revolution, a tremendous innovation. Sara Schneirer took the right approach. She approached various gedolim (the Chofetz Chaim, the Gerrer Rebbe, and others) to receive approval for her innovation and a bracha for its success. That is a classic example of a successful, productive innovation. Nevertheless, the general tendency to be wary of changes is an expression of our commitment to the mesora.

May we be blessed with a new year filled with nachas, health, growth, and bracha in all areas of our lives and out families lives.
